Humanitarian Aid is Never a Crime

At No More Deaths/No Más Muertes, we have working groups (WGs) that focus on different actions. Think of them as "departments" or "programs" within our organization. Most people don't realize the breadth of work we do within No More Deaths/No Más Muertes! See below for a quick breakdown of these working groups:

- **Abuse Documentation -** This working group researches, documents and exposes patterns of abuse against people crossing the border at the hands of Border Patrol and other government agencies. See their published reports at www.nomoredeaths.org.
- **BIPOC** The BIPOC working group is comprised of desert aid volunteers, NMD staff and other working group volunteers. They identify as Black, Indigenous, or People of Color. This group offers resources and support for NMD staff and volunteers who identify as BIPOC (Black, Indegenious, and People of Color).
- Desert Aid The desert aid working group leaves food, water & supplies on the desert trails in the Arizona borderlands.. We also operate a humanitarian aid camp, Byrd Camp, near Ariyaca.
- **Fundraising** A small working group that processes donations, writes/edits the twice yearly newsletter, sends out monthly eblasts, plans fundraising events and posts fundraising-focused social media.
- **Keep Tucson Together -** KTT offers legal aid to community members who are applying for status and facing deportation, or applying for citizenship. They also train participants to help others navigate the immigration court process.
- Media This working group handles all media aspects of NMD. They are in charge of social media, press releases and speaking with journalists and other outlets.
- Nogales In northern Sonora, the Nogales working group provides phone calls and medical aid to deportees, stranded refugees and northbound migrants. They also offer other services such as recovering personal effects from the US Border Patrol.
- Northern Mexico In the northern Mexico border towns of Altar, Caborca, Sonoyta, Sasabe, and Agua Prieta we work with migrant shelters to supply food, clothing, and medical aid for migrants. We also subsidize the operations of the shelters.

Search & Rescue/Recovery (SAR) / Hotline - The SAR working group answers all phone calls that come into the 24-hour missing migrants hotline. In addition, they respond to emergency calls and mobilize search & rescue teams.
