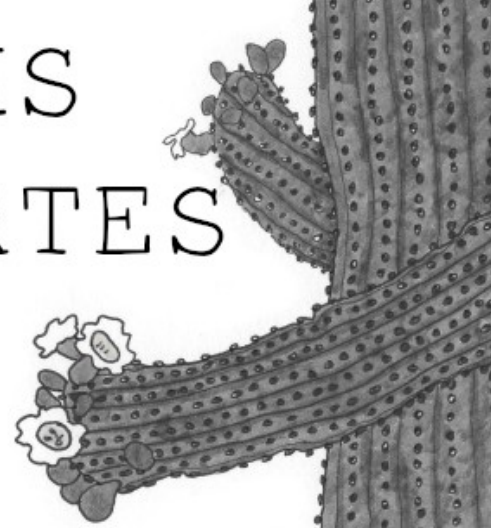

A Note from No More Deaths/No Más Muertes

Dear friends and supporters,

Thank you for continuing to stand with us. This year has been difficult as immigrants, families, and communities face growing attacks, but we have also witnessed powerful acts of solidarity, compassion, and mutual care.

At the border, conditions remain urgent. While crossings briefly slowed earlier this year, they have never stopped because the forces driving migration have not gone away. Food, water, and a caring presence remains as important as ever in the borderlands. Many people seeking safety are now stranded in Mexico, placing immense pressure on the shelter networks we support. Meanwhile, as detention expands in the U.S., our hotline team continues helping families locate loved ones within a complex system.

Our work has shifted, but it remains as essential as ever.

We also know this has been a financially difficult year for many. As an organization sustained largely by small individual donations, we are deeply grateful for every act of support, care, and solidarity.

A snapshot of our work this fiscal year:

- Placed 16,425 gallons of water on migrant trails
- Distributed \$66,000 of water, food, and medicine to migrants at our remote aid camp and on migrant trails
- Delivered \$47,000 of humanitarian aid supplies to allied shelters in Northern Mexico towns of Altar, Caborca, Sasabe, and Sonoyta
- The Missing Migrant Hotline responded to 1,522 calls and distributed \$4,200 to support families
- Hosted and trained 70 new volunteers from Tucson and across the country through our Desert Aid Volunteer Program

WHERE AID MEETS BARRIERS:

El Paso-Area Data Center Acting as Tertiary Border Wall. The third rail of humanitarian aid.

A dispatch from El Paso by La Cruz Rosa

DHS contractors are blasting through Mt. Cristo Rey, a historic migration corridor and sacred site just west of El Paso, to build a wall that threatens to push migrants further into remote areas – like the desert surrounding Santa Teresa, NM, an area with an already high concentration of deaths.

With construction of a secondary border wall in Santa Teresa ongoing another deadly form of “deterrence” threatens to emerge just North: Oracle and OpenAI’s data center complex known as Project Jupiter. Rapidly expanding and flanked by solar fields fortified by electric fencing, the data center site blocks more direct routes to the city and hinders access to aid, including water barrels placed by La Cruz Rosa.

We warn that the wall on Cristo Rey, combined with expansive new data center infrastructure, adjacent solar fields, and a proposed secondary wall in Santa Teresa, will create an even more dangerous and fragmented landscape for both migrants and wildlife. Together, these barriers will severely restrict natural movement corridors, forcing migration routes further west into more remote and hazardous terrain where access to life-saving aid and resources is extremely limited.

In an area where people are dying from lack of water and mobility, we demand that our policies and precious water resources be utilized in service of life, not death!

Summer in the desert means triple-digit temperatures, scarce water, and life-or-death decisions made in the shade of a saguaro. This is when your support matters most.

Every day, the Missing Migrant Hotline answers calls from people who are lost, injured, or watching their water run out. We guide them through finding their location and connect them to resources step-by-step. The calls we take are often the last voice someone hears before help arrives or the only one they hear at all.

Because of you, we're there to pick up the phone. Because of you, more people make it through the night.

This year, your donations have already helped us answer 100+ calls, coordinate 4 rescues and the heat is just getting started. As summer starts, the calls will not stop. Neither will we.

Every time we answer the call, we stand in a long line of people who refuse to look away: volunteers, hotline operators, water-drop teams, and donors like you. Plain and simple, you make this possible.

We don't take that for granted. Thank you for trusting us with your generosity, and for choosing to be part of a community that believes no one should die crossing this land.

In the words of a volunteer:

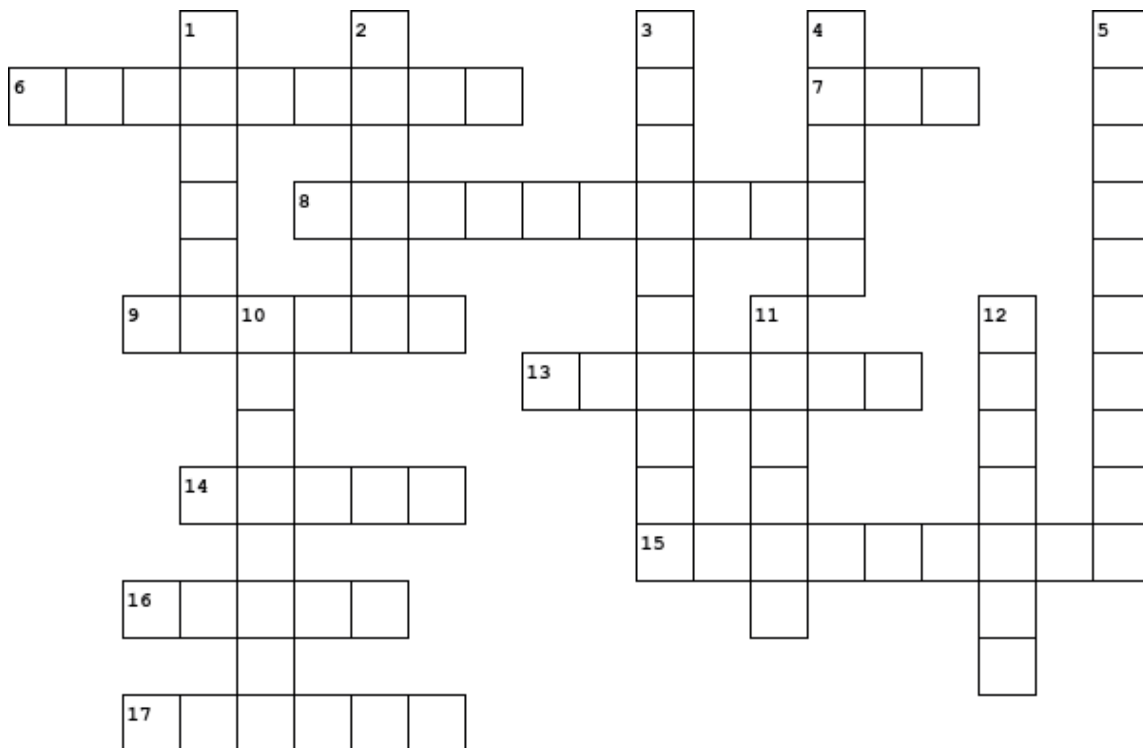

And for me personally, volunteering with No More Deaths meant confronting the severed history of my own family; one also scarred by the trauma of migration. My desire to volunteer was fueled by exasperation: an exhaustion from witnessing the daily violence committed to the separation of peoples; the exploitation of those in need. Volunteering with No More Deaths is a confrontation of these traumas, but it is also a conversation with fellow volunteers in how we process these emotions, how we understand them and continue doing the work. It is another step in the process of healing in the new communities we are building."

No More Deaths Crossword Puzzle

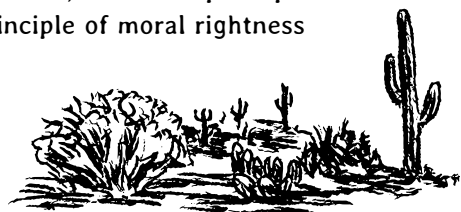
